Good 125 million Americans (40%) are in health plans that report quality results



Even Better 9.7 million New Yorkers (50%) are in health plans that report quality results



Innovations in New York



- Emphasis on improvement in Medicaid plans
- Incentives for caring for people with both Medicare and Medicaid ("dual-eligibiles")
- New York Health Benefit Exchange coming this fall

- Patient-centered medical homes (PCMH)
 - Most NCQA-Recognized PCMHs of any state (More than 2x the sites & clinicians as the #2 state)
 - Almost 40% of Medicaid patients have a PCMH
- Primary Care Information Project (NYC)
 - Turns safety net practices into medical homes
 - Decision support systems contribute to quality
 - New York State Health Foundation support for NCQA Diabetes Recognition Program

- Taconic IPA (Fishkill)
 - Leader in PCMH and ACO development
- Crystal Run Health Care (Middletown)
 - One of the first six NCQA-Accredited ACOs



Childhood Immunization Status: Combination









Measure What You Want to Improve: Obesity Measuring BMI (3-17 Years)





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





Comprehensive Diabetes Care: Good Glycemic Control (HbA1c <7%)





Improving After Stagnating Use of High-Risk Medications in the Elderly







Rating of Personal Doctor: Rating of 8, 9 or 10






