- UH cares for nearly 1,000,000 unique patients annually
- UH trains more than 1,000 residents and fellows annually
- For 2014-2015, US News & World Report ranked UH Case Medical Center in all 12 specialties for the third year in a row




UH Rainbow Babies & Children's Hospital

- Non-profit 244-bed children's hospital founded in 1887
- 10,000 annual inpatient discharges
- 700,000 annual ambulatory encounters
- Primary pediatric academic affiliate of Case Western Reserve University
- Department of Pediatrics ranks 3rd in NIH funding in medical school-based departments
- 83 Pediatric Residents and 75 Pediatric Fellowships
- Consistently ranked among the top children's hospitals by US News and World Report



Greater University Circle The Link Between Socioeconomic Status and Health

- One of the poorest neighborhoods in the nation, with persistent poverty
- Median household income of \$18,500
- 24% Unemployment
- Infant Mortality
 - Ohio 6.4/1000 (Caucasian)
 - Ohio 14/1000 (African-American)
 - Cuyahoga County 8.7/1000
 - University Circle 18.6/100
